Moved by Wedekind, seconded by Kolb and carried to approve the minutes of March 10, 2015.

Moved by Alt, seconded by Petty and carried to approve the agenda.

Resolution No. 14-126

RESOLUTION AWARDING THE SALE OF \$3,040,000
GENERAL OBLIGATION UW SYSTEM CAMPUS BONDS, SERIES 2015A

WHEREAS, on February 10, 2015, the Common Council of the City of Baraboo, Sauk County, Wisconsin (the "City") adopted an Initial Resolution (the "Initial Resolution") authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed \$3,040,000 to raise funds for the public purpose of paying the cost of projects, including construction of a new

science facility, on a University of Wisconsin System college campus, as defined in Section 36.05(6m), Wisconsin Statutes (the "Project");

WHEREAS, pursuant to the provisions of Section 67.05, Wisconsin Statutes, within 15 days following the adoption of the Initial Resolution, the City Clerk caused a notice to electors to be published, stating the purpose and maximum principal amount of the bond issue authorized by the Initial Resolution and describing the opportunity and procedure for submitting a petition requesting a referendum on the bond issue authorized by the Initial Resolution;

WHEREAS, to date, no petition for referendum has been filed with the City Clerk, and the time to file such a petition shall expire on March 12, 2015;

WHEREAS, on February 10, 2015, the Common Council of the City also adopted a resolution entitled: "Resolution Providing for the Sale of \$3,040,000 General Obligation UW System Campus Bonds", providing that the general obligation bond issue authorized by the Initial Resolution be issued and designated as "General Obligation UW System Campus Bonds" (the "Bonds") for the purpose of paying the cost of the Project;

WHEREAS, the Common Council now deems it to be necessary, desirable and in the best interest of the City that the Bonds be issued in the aggregate principal amount of \$3,040,000;

WHEREAS, the Common Council hereby finds and determines that the Project is within the City's power to undertake and therefore serves a "public purpose" as that term is defined in Section 67.04(1)(b), Wisconsin Statutes;

WHEREAS, the City has directed Ehlers & Associates, Inc. ("Ehlers") to take the steps necessary to sell the Bonds;

WHEREAS, Ehlers, in consultation with the officials of the City, prepared a Notice of Sale (a copy of which is attached hereto as Exhibit A and incorporated herein by this reference) setting forth the details of and the bid requirements for the Bonds and indicating that the Bonds would be offered for public sale on March 10, 2015;

WHEREAS, the City Clerk (in consultation with Ehlers) caused a form of notice of the sale to be published and/or announced and caused the Notice of Sale to be distributed to potential bidders offering the Bonds for public sale on March 10, 2015;

WHEREAS, the City has duly received bids for the Bonds as described on the Bid Tabulation attached hereto as Exhibit B and incorporated herein by this reference (the "Bid Tabulation"); and

WHEREAS, it has been determined that the bid proposal (the "Proposal") submitted by the financial institution listed first on the Bid Tabulation fully complies with the bid requirements set forth in the Notice of Sale and is deemed to be the most advantageous to the City. Ehlers has recommended that the City accept the Proposal. A copy of said Proposal submitted by such institution (the "Purchaser") is attached hereto as Exhibit C and incorporated herein by this reference.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Common Council of the City that:

Section 1A. Ratification of the Notice of Sale and Offering Materials. The Common Council of the City hereby ratifies and approves the details of the Bonds set forth in Exhibit A

attached hereto as and for the details of the Bonds. The Notice of Sale and any other offering materials prepared and circulated by Ehlers are hereby ratified and approved in all respects. All actions taken by officers of the City and Ehlers in connection with the preparation and distribution of the Notice of Sale, and any other offering materials are hereby ratified and approved in all respects.

Section 1B. Award of the Bonds. Subject to the condition that no valid petition for a referendum is filed by March 12, 2015 in connection with the Initial Resolution, the Proposal of the Purchaser offering to purchase the Bonds for the sum set forth on the Proposal, plus accrued interest to the date of delivery, resulting in a true interest cost as set forth on the Proposal is hereby accepted. The Mayor and City Clerk or other appropriate officers of the City are authorized and directed to execute an acceptance of the Proposal on behalf of the City. The good faith deposit of the Purchaser shall be retained by the City Treasurer until the closing of the bond issue, and any good faith deposits submitted by unsuccessful bidders shall be promptly returned. The Bonds shall bear interest at the rates set forth on the Proposal.

Section 2. Terms of the Bonds. The Bonds shall be designated "General Obligation UW System Campus Bonds, Series 2015A"; shall be issued in the aggregate principal amount of \$3,040,000; shall be dated April 1, 2015; shall be in the denomination of \$5,000 or any integral multiple thereof; shall be numbered R-1 and upward; and shall bear interest at the rates per annum and mature on April 1 of each year, in the years and principal amounts as set forth on the Pricing Summary attached hereto as Exhibit D-1 and incorporated herein by this reference. Interest shall be payable semi-annually on April 1 and October 1 of each year commencing on April 1, 2016. Interest shall be computed upon the basis of a 360-day year of twelve 30-day months and will be rounded pursuant to the rules of the Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board. The schedule of principal and interest payments due on the Bonds is set forth on the Debt Service Schedule attached hereto as Exhibit D-2 and incorporated herein by this reference (the "Schedule").

Section 3. Redemption Provisions. The Bonds maturing on April 1, 2024 and thereafter shall be subject to redemption prior to maturity, at the option of the City, on April 1, 2023 or on any date thereafter. Said Bonds shall be redeemable as a whole or in part, and if in part, from maturities selected by the City and within each maturity, by lot, at the principal amount thereof, plus accrued interest to the date of redemption. [If the Proposal specifies that any of the Bonds are subject to mandatory redemption, the terms of such mandatory redemption are set forth on an attachment hereto as Exhibit MRP and incorporated herein by this reference.]

Section 4. Form of the Bonds. The Bonds shall be issued in registered form and shall be executed and delivered in substantially the form attached hereto as Exhibit E and incorporated herein by this reference.

Section 5. Tax Provisions.

(A) Direct Annual Irrepealable Tax Levy. For the purpose of paying the principal of and interest on the Bonds as the same becomes due, the full faith, credit and resources of the City are hereby irrevocably pledged, and there is hereby levied upon all of the taxable property of the City a direct annual irrepealable tax in the years 2015 through 2034 for the payments due in the years 2016 through 2035 in the amounts set forth on the Schedule.

(B) Tax Collection. So long as any part of the principal of or interest on the Bonds remains unpaid, the City shall be and continue without power to repeal such levy or obstruct the collection of said tax until all such payments have been made or provided for. After the issuance of the Bonds, said tax shall be, from year to year, carried onto the tax roll of the City and collected in addition to all other taxes and in the same manner and at the same time as other taxes of the City for said years are collected, except that the amount of tax carried onto the tax roll may be reduced in any year by the amount of any surplus money in the Debt Service Fund Account created below.

(C) Additional Funds. If at any time there shall be on hand insufficient funds from the aforesaid tax levy to meet principal and/or interest payments on said Bonds when due, the requisite amounts shall be paid from other funds of the City then available, which sums shall be replaced upon the collection of the taxes herein levied.

Section 6. Segregated Debt Service Fund Account.

(A) Creation and Deposits. There be and there hereby is established in the treasury of the City, if one has not already been created, a debt service fund, separate and distinct from every other fund, which shall be maintained in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. Debt service or sinking funds established for obligations previously issued by the City may be considered as separate and distinct accounts within the debt service fund.

Within the debt service fund, there hereby is established a separate and distinct account designated as the "Debt Service Fund Account for \$3,040,000 General Obligation UW System Campus Bonds, Series 2015A, dated April 1, 2015" (the "Debt Service Fund Account") and such account shall be maintained until the indebtedness evidenced by the Bonds is fully paid or otherwise extinguished. The City Treasurer shall deposit in the Debt Service Fund Account (i) all accrued interest received by the City at the time of delivery of and payment for the Bonds; (ii) any premium which may be received by the City above the par value of the Bonds and accrued interest thereon; (iii) all money raised by the taxes herein levied and any amounts appropriated for the specific purpose of meeting principal of and interest on the Bonds when due; (iv) such other sums as may be necessary at any time to pay principal of and interest on the Bonds when due; (v) surplus monies in the Borrowed Money Fund as specified below; and (vi) such further deposits as may be required by Section 67.11, Wisconsin Statutes.

(B) Use and Investment. No money shall be withdrawn from the Debt Service Fund Account and appropriated for any purpose other than the payment of principal of and interest on the Bonds until all such principal and interest has been paid in full and the Bonds canceled; provided (i) the funds to provide for each payment of principal of and interest on the Bonds prior to the scheduled receipt of taxes from the next succeeding tax collection may be invested in direct obligations of the United States of America maturing in time to make such payments when they are due or in other investments permitted by law; and (ii) any funds over and above the amount of such principal and interest payments on the Bonds may be used to reduce the next succeeding tax levy, or may, at the option of the City, be invested by purchasing the Bonds as permitted by and subject to Section 67.11(2)(a), Wisconsin Statutes, or in permitted municipal investments under the pertinent provisions of the Wisconsin Statutes ("Permitted Investments"), which investments shall continue to be a part of the Debt Service Fund Account. Any investment of the Debt Service Fund Account shall at all times conform with the provisions of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code") and any applicable Treasury Regulations (the "Regulations").

(C) Remaining Monies. When all of the Bonds have been paid in full and canceled, and all Permitted Investments disposed of, any money remaining in the Debt Service Fund Account shall be transferred and deposited in the general fund of the City, unless the Common Council directs otherwise.

Section 7. Proceeds of the Bonds; Segregated Borrowed Money Fund. The proceeds of the Bonds (the "Bond Proceeds") (other than any premium and accrued interest which must be paid at the time of the delivery of the Bonds into the Debt Service Fund Account created above) shall be deposited into a special fund separate and distinct from all other funds of the City and disbursed solely for the purposes for which borrowed or for the payment of the principal of and the interest on the Bonds. Monies in the Borrowed Money Fund may be temporarily invested in Permitted Investments. Any monies, including any income from Permitted Investments, remaining in the Borrowed Money Fund after the purpose for which the Bonds have been issued has been accomplished, and, at any time, any monies as are not needed and which obviously thereafter cannot be needed for such purpose shall be deposited in the Debt Service Fund Account.

Section 8. No Arbitrage. All investments made pursuant to this Resolution shall be Permitted Investments, but no such investment shall be made in such a manner as would cause the Bonds to be "arbitrage bonds" within the meaning of Section 148 of the Code or the Regulations and an officer of the City, charged with the responsibility for issuing the Bonds, shall certify as to facts, estimates, circumstances and reasonable expectations in existence on the date of delivery of the Bonds to the Purchaser which will permit the conclusion that the Bonds are not "arbitrage bonds," within the meaning of the Code or Regulations.

Section 9. Compliance with Federal Tax Laws. (a) The City represents and covenants that the projects financed by the Bonds and the ownership, management and use of the projects will not cause the Bonds to be "private activity bonds" within the meaning of Section 141 of the Code. The City further covenants that it shall comply with the provisions of the Code to the extent necessary to maintain the tax-exempt status of the interest on the Bonds including, if applicable, the rebate requirements of Section 148(f) of the Code. The City further covenants that it will not take any action, omit to take any action or permit the taking or omission of any action within its control (including, without limitation, making or permitting any use of the proceeds of the Bonds) if taking, permitting or omitting to take such action would cause any of the Bonds to be an arbitrage bond or a private activity bond within the meaning of the Code or would otherwise cause interest on the Bonds to be included in the gross income of the recipients thereof for federal income tax purposes. The City Clerk or other officer of the City charged with the responsibility of issuing the Bonds shall provide an appropriate certificate of the City certifying that the City can and covenanting that it will comply with the provisions of the Code and Regulations.

(b) The City also covenants to use its best efforts to meet the requirements and restrictions of any different or additional federal legislation which may be made applicable to the Bonds provided that in meeting such requirements the City will do so only to the extent consistent with the proceedings authorizing the Bonds and the laws of the State of Wisconsin and to the extent that there is a reasonable period of time in which to comply.

Section 10. Designation as Qualified Tax-Exempt Obligations. The Bonds are hereby designated as "qualified tax-exempt obligations" for purposes of Section 265 of the Code, relating to the ability of financial institutions to deduct from income for federal income tax

Section 14. Record Date. The fifteenth day of each calendar month next preceding each interest payment date shall be the record date for the Bonds (the "Record Date"). Payment of interest on the Bonds on any interest payment date shall be made to the registered owners of the Bonds as they appear on the registration book of the City at the close of business on the Record Date.

Section 15. Utilization of The Depository Trust Company Book-Entry-Only System. In order to make the Bonds eligible for the services provided by The Depository Trust Company, New York, New York ("DTC"), the City agrees to the applicable provisions set forth in the Blanket Issuer Letter of Representations previously executed on behalf of the City and on file in the City Clerk's office.

Section 16. Payment of Issuance Expenses. The City authorizes the Purchaser to forward the amount of the proceeds of the Bonds allocable to the payment of issuance expenses to KleinBank, Chaska, Minnesota at Closing for further distribution as directed by Ehlers.

Section 17. Official Statement. The Common Council hereby approves the Preliminary Official Statement with respect to the Bonds and deems the Preliminary Official Statement as "final" as of its date for purposes of SEC Rule 15c2-12 promulgated by the Securities and Exchange Commission pursuant to the Securities and Exchange Act of 1934 (the "Rule"). All actions taken by officers of the City in connection with the preparation of such Preliminary Official Statement and any addenda to it are hereby ratified and approved. In connection with the Closing, the appropriate City official shall certify the Preliminary Official Statement and any addenda. The City Clerk shall cause copies of the Preliminary Official Statement and any addenda to be distributed to the Purchaser.

Section 18. Undertaking to Provide Continuing Disclosure. The City hereby covenants and agrees, for the benefit of the owners of the Bonds, to enter into a written undertaking (the "Undertaking") if required by the Rule to provide continuing disclosure of certain financial information and operating data and timely notices of the occurrence of certain events in accordance with the Rule. The Undertaking shall be enforceable by the owners of the Bonds or by the Purchaser on behalf of such owners (provided that the rights of the owners and the Purchaser to enforce the Undertaking shall be limited to a right to obtain specific performance of the obligations thereunder and any failure by the City to comply with the provisions of the Undertaking shall not be an event of default with respect to the Bonds).

To the extent required under the Rule, the Mayor and City Clerk, or other officer of the City charged with the responsibility for issuing the Bonds, shall provide a Continuing Disclosure Certificate for inclusion in the transcript of proceedings, setting forth the details and terms of the City's Undertaking.

Section 19. Record Book. The City Clerk shall provide and keep the transcript of proceedings as a separate record book (the "Record Book") and shall record a full and correct statement of every step or proceeding had or taken in the course of authorizing and issuing the Bonds in the Record Book.

Section 20. Bond Insurance. If the Purchaser determines to obtain municipal bond insurance with respect to the Bonds, the officers of the City are authorized to take all actions necessary to obtain such municipal bond insurance. The Mayor and City Clerk are authorized to agree to such additional provisions as the bond insurer may reasonably request and which are acceptable to the Mayor and City Clerk including provisions regarding restrictions on investment

of Bond proceeds, the payment procedure under the municipal bond insurance policy, the rights of the bond insurer in the event of default and payment of the Bonds by the bond insurer and notices to be given to the bond insurer. In addition, any reference required by the bond insurer to the municipal bond insurance policy shall be made in the form of Bond provided herein.

Section 21. Conflicting Resolutions; Severability; Effective Date. All prior resolutions, rules or other actions of the Common Council or any parts thereof in conflict with the provisions hereof shall be, and the same are, hereby rescinded insofar as the same may so conflict. In the event that any one or more provisions hereof shall for any reason be held to be illegal or invalid, such illegality or invalidity shall not affect any other provisions hereof. The foregoing shall take effect immediately upon adoption and approval in the manner provided by law.

Moved by Wedekind, seconded by Alt, and carried that **Resolution No. 14-126** be approved - 7 ayes. Mike Harrigan reported on the sale of the bonds. 4 bids were received and the lowest bid from FTN Financial Markets, Memphis TN for 2.7779%. He also referred to the movement of the market in the last 12 months, indicating this is a favorable time for borrowing money. The underwriter gave a good discount which allowed the size of the issue to be reduced to \$3,040,000. Moody’s Investor Service gave a very strong report based on our reserve levels and sound financial condition and resulted in our bond rating of Aa3.

Background: The Council will recall that in November 2014, GE Capital Corporation sued the City of Baraboo in Circuit Court with regard to a personal property tax issue. In February 2013, GE Capital filed a personal property tax return with the City Assessor for property is leased to Seneca Foods. The value of the personal property was reported as \$3,131,600, and a personal property tax of \$72,250 was paid on December 18, 2013.

GE Capital later determined that the property as reported on the personal property tax return was exempt from tax as it is manufacturing property and not subject to tax pursuant to §70.995, Stats. Correspondence between GE Capital and the City was exchanged during the summer of 2014. With no resolution however, the issue was then filed with the Circuit Court.

The City and GE Capital have come to an agreement regarding settlement of the pending case. The settlement was initially reviewed by the Finance Committee in closed session, and approved by Finance on March 24, 2015. The settlement provides for the immediate refund of the tax paid, and the submission to the Department of Revenue a charge back request in October 2015. If DOR approves the charge back, the litigation is resolved. If it is not approved, GE will return the refund to the City and the litigation will continue before the court.

SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT

This Settlement Agreement (“Agreement”), dated and effective as of the last date executed below (the “effective date”), is made and entered into by and between General Electric Capital Corporation (the “Plaintiff”) and City of Baraboo, a Wisconsin municipality (the “Defendant”).

RECITALS

WHEREAS, Plaintiff has alleged that certain exempt manufacturing equipment was reported to the City and assessed in error and requested a refund of 2013 personal property taxes in the amount of \$72,250.00.

WHEREAS, Defendant denied Plaintiff’s refund claim.

WHEREAS, Plaintiff has commenced a civil action against Plaintiff in Sauk County Circuit Court (Case No. 14CV0521) requesting judgment against the City in the amount of \$72,250.00, plus interest, together with its costs and disbursements and such other relief as the Court may find just and proper (the “Litigation”).

WHEREAS, the parties wish to settle their dispute arising out of the Litigation.

AGREEMENT

NOW, THEREFORE, based on the foregoing and in consideration of the mutual promises and covenants contained herein, the adequacy of which is hereby acknowledged, the Plaintiff and Defendant agree as follows:

1. On or before April 1, 2015, Defendant shall refund to Plaintiff \$72,250.00 of its 2013 personal property tax payment, without interest (the “Refund Amount”). Plaintiff waives any and all interest that may accrue to this case as a result of this settlement.
2. On or before October 1, 2015, Defendant shall submit a “Request for Charge Back of Rescinded or Refunded Taxes” to the Wisconsin Department of Revenue (“DOR”)

under Wis. Stat. §74.41 that includes the Refund Amount and shall thereafter use its best efforts to obtain the DOR's approval of the charge back and levy adjustment for such Refund Amount. ("Charge Back").

3. The litigation shall be held in abeyance until December 15, 2015.

4. Defendant shall provide Plaintiff with a copy of the DOR's Charge Back determination pursuant to Wis. Stat. §74.41(3) within three (3) business days after Defendant receives such determination.

5. If the DOR approves the Charge Back, Plaintiff shall retain the Refund Amount, and the parties promptly shall cause their counsel to enter into a stipulation for the dismissal of the Litigation on the merits and without costs to either party.

6. If the DOR disallows the Charge Back, and if the parties do not agree upon a mutually acceptable alternative resolution of the Litigation, Plaintiff shall repay the entire Refund Amount to the City, without interest or other charges, and Plaintiff may resume the Litigation proceedings.

7. **Counterparts.** This Agreement may be executed in one or more counterparts (including copies and PDF file versions of the original signatures) all of which together constitute one and the same instrument.

8. **Authority.** The individuals executing this Agreement represent and warrant that they have obtained the legal authority to execute this Agreement on behalf of the Plaintiff or Defendant as indicated.





Airport Operations: Giese gave a report of airport activities for the last month, highlighting activities of tree removal and trimming. Current estimates for the work is \$3M with 95% being paid by state and federal grants. The State is in the process of putting together their federal budget request and may include our project, depending upon competition from other airports and the total financial requests of all Wisconsin airports. The local airport patrons have asked for the runway to be widened from 75' to 100' to improve safety since there is only one paved runway. We will hear from the State in early May as to whether our project is funded or not.

Airport Improvements Petition: The current petition for pavement work at the airport expires later this year so the runway work needs to be requested by petitioning the state for the funding. Moved by Ellington, seconded by Alt and carried unanimously to recommend that the Council petition the State for the runway project design, studies, reconstruction and any related work.

Next meeting is to be held April 6, 2015 at 12 p.m.
